More Information on Public Service Announcement Restrictions *by James McMahan, WACO Staff*

There has been significant information among WACO members regarding the new restrictions placed on elected officials regarding public service announcements beginning January 1 of an election year (Chapter 204, Sec. 703, Laws of 2010). In our discussions with the Public Disclosure Commission (PDC), WACO has learned that the PDC *does* have a definition of a public service announcement in WAC 390-05-525, which states:

WAC 390-05-525: Public service announcement.

(1) "Public service announcement" means a communication meets all the following criteria. The communication is:

- (a) Designed to benefit or promote the community's health, safety or welfare or nonprofit community events;
- (b) Not selling a product or service;
- (c) Sponsored by an organization with a history of routinely providing the community such outreach public service messages in the service area of the organization;
- (d) Of primary interest to the general public and is not targeted to reach only voters or voters in a specific jurisdiction;
- (e) Not coordinated with or controlled or paid for by a candidate's authorized committee or political committee;
- (f) Subject to the policies for public service announcements of the entity broadcasting, transmitting, mailing, erecting, distributing or otherwise publishing the communication including policies regarding length, timing and manner of distribution; and
- (g) One for which the arrangements to include a reference or depiction of the candidate or candidates in the communication were made at least six months before the candidate became a candidate.

(2) Examples of public service announcements include but are not limited to communications regarding nonprofit community events, outreach or awareness activities such as: Breast cancer screening, heart disease, domestic violence, organ donation, emergency or other disaster relief for organizations such as the Red Cross, programs designed to encourage reading by school children, childhood safety, fund drives for charitable programs such as United Way, and similar matters.

[Statutory Authority: RCW [42.17.370](#) and [42.17.562](#). 06-11-132, § 390-05-525, filed 5/23/06, effective 6/23/06.]

There are other definitions of public service announcements that can be found in case law and the Federal Communications Commission, but we believe that this is the definition that the PDC will use to enforce the provisions of HB 2016.

As always, we encourage county officials to seek and follow the advice of their prosecutor on all legal matters.

Meth Pilots Survive Budget Cuts

Thirteen rural counties cheered when Governor Gregoire signed the budget recently and authorized funding of the Meth Pilot Project for Fiscal Year 2011. The pilot was established in 2006 with the passage of [SB 6239](#) to assist drug enforcement and prosecution in underserved rural counties. [SB 6239](#) expired this year. In the four year period, over \$400 million in illicit drugs have been taken off the streets as a result and the "meth" pilot has become an "all drug" enforcement.

[SB 6239](#) provided four deputy sheriffs for each region, along with two deputy prosecutors and one court clerk per region. The counties included Ferry, Lincoln, Pend Oreille, Stevens, Asotin, Columbia, Garfield, Walla Walla, Cowlitz, Grays Harbor, Lewis, Pacific and Wahkiakum, which were divided into the NE, SE, and SW regions.

Planning has already begun to develop a strategy to make sure the 2011 Legislature keeps the meth pilots going. The meth counties will hold their third annual "Summit" meeting during the WACO Annual Conference at Suncadia in October.

Records and Elections News

After many years of county service, Carolyn Ableman, King County Director of Records and Licensing Services, has announced she will be leaving June 1 to pursue some exciting new professional opportunities.

Carolyn has taken a position as the PREP (National Local Chapter) Coordinator for the Property Records Industry Association (PRIA). PRIA is a non-profit standards setting association that works with both the business and government communities in defining issues and standards relating to real property documents. She has been a Board member, Committee Chair, and one of the original members of PRIA since its inception in 2002, and one of the originators of the Washington State Prep Chapter. Grants Available for Records Preservation

Are you aware of any original agency records from your jurisdiction that are currently held by historical organizations, genealogical societies, museums, academic archives, or similar institutions? Washington State Archives is pleased to announce that there is a grant program now available to preserve and protect historical collections of local government records that are currently held *outside of agency custody*.

This grant program is courtesy of the Washington State Historical Records Advisory Board (WSHRAB). This funding is administered through WSHRAB and is available to non-government institutions that may hold certain local government records.

This is not the same as the Local Government Grant Program for local government agencies funded by Washington State Archives.

Historical and genealogical societies, museums and similar institutions are eligible for up to \$5,000.00 in grant funding in order to:

- Create digital images of the records
- Preserve the originals
- Have images publicly accessible through the Washington State Digital Archives

Digitizing these records will improve researcher access, consolidate collections, and improve preservation.

Some examples of eligible records may be:

- Territorial and early statehood records
- Local census records
- Records of local commissions, boards and councils
- Historic maps and photographs
- School records

State Board of Natural Resources Approves Land Transfers in San Juan and Mason Counties

Parcels include future addition to national historic park, county parks and additional state-owned tideland in Hood Canal

OLYMPIA – The state Board of Natural Resources on May 4 approved the direct transfer of 320 acres of Common School trust forestland to San Juan County for \$3.1 million. The transfer will be paid for by a federal appropriation passed last year and sets the stage for the property to be included in the U. S. National Park Service’s San Juan Island National Historic Park.

“I am pleased that the U.S. Congress and the Obama Administration recognized the significance of the Mitchell Hill property and put a priority on helping to assure its continued preservation as a cultural and historic landmark,” said Commissioner of Public Lands Peter Goldmark.

The 320 acres of state trust land are adjacent to the English Camp unit of the federal historic park and include a 19th

Century-era road used by British and American troops who jointly occupied the area until 1872.

The price was set after an appraisal determined the property had high value as a potential site for large-lot residences. With the \$3.1 million it receives from the transfer, the state will purchase replacement property for the Common School trust elsewhere that is more suitable for natural resources revenue production to support public school construction in Washington State.

The property has been managed for the school trust by the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR). Because of federal restrictions on direct purchases of land from states by the Park Service, the San Juan County Land Bank and The Conservation Fund, a private, non-profit corporation, partnered with DNR and the Park Service to facilitate the transaction.

Land Transferred to Mason County and State Aquatic Resources

In another action May 4, the Board approved the transfer of seven acres of Common School Trust land to Mason County Parks for \$81,000 via the state's Trust Land Transfer (TLT) Program. Located along North Shore Road, adjacent to Menards Landing County Park, about 20 miles west of Belfair, the parcel will be used by Mason County as a recreation area and trailhead for hikers for future planned trails in the area.

"This property is an important addition to public recreation in Mason County because it will serve as a future trailhead for a planned trail connecting Menards Landing Park and Harvey Rendsland Park," said John Keates, Mason County Parks Director.

The Board also approved the transfer of 26 acres of Common School Trust land adjoining Hood Canal for \$860,000. The property will be managed as state-owned tidelands.

The TLT program will reimburse the Common School Trust for both properties. The trust uses the legislatively appropriated funds to fund school construction and replace lands (and any standing timber) that are transferred to other public agencies for open space, wildlife habitat, or recreation.

DNR managing land for trust beneficiaries

DNR manages 5.6 million acres of state land, including:

- 2.9 million acres of state trust lands that support public schools, universities, prisons, other state institutions, and county services;
- 2.6 million acres of aquatic lands; and
- 130,000 acres of Natural Areas and Natural Resource Conservation Areas.

Peter Goldmark is the 13th Commissioner of Public Lands since statehood in 1889 and the first from Eastern Washington.

General Government Issues

Records Alert on Digital Scanners/Photocopiers from State Archivist Jerry Handfield

This Records Alert as a part of the State Archivist's duty to "gather and disseminate to interested agencies information on all phases of records management and current practices...for efficient and economical management and preservation of records." RCW 40.14.020(7).

According to the article, *Digital Photocopiers Loaded with Secrets*, (<http://www.cbsnews.com/stories/2010/04/19/eveningnews/main6412439.shtml>), the new generation digital scanner/copiers contain hard drives which often preserve a copy of every image scanned. We need to pay special attention to maintaining the confidentiality and security of public records.

Since the images on the hard drives of digital scanners/copiers are public records, all local, state and federal rules must be followed. There are steps that can be taken to erase images on hard drives on scanners/copiers before they are traded in.

We sent a similar message to all State Records Officers and 988 persons on our Local Government Records listserve, as well as all Agency Directors, statewide Elected Officials, the Supreme Court, County Clerks, County Auditors, the Secretary of the Senate, and the Chief Clerk in the House of Representatives.

State Awards \$14 Million for Community Projects

The Washington State Department of Commerce has selected 18 cities and counties throughout the state to receive over \$14 million dollars in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) General Purpose Grants for 2010.

The funds will improve water and wastewater systems, construct community facilities, provide loans to microenterprises, and rehabilitate affordable housing to benefit low- and moderate-income persons. The projects were selected from 53 grant applications requesting a total of over \$37 million.

"These funds support rural communities in building local capacity for economic development and will create immediate jobs in the construction sector," said Rogers Weed, Director, Washington State Department of Commerce.

The state CDBG program receives annual funding from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to provide grants to small cities (under 50,000 population) and rural counties (under 200,000 population). Larger cities and counties receive their own entitlement funding directly from HUD. Since 1982, the state CDBG program has awarded more than \$419 million in grants for over 1,100 locally prioritized community development projects. Historic Lady Gets Facelift

The Garfield County Courthouse will close at noon next Thursday, May 13, until Monday, May 17, and as County Auditor Donna Deal says, "we are going back to school." Actually, the entire Courthouse is moving into the Pomeroy Grade School for the coming year while the historic building is being renovated. County Commissioner Dean Burton tells us that Garfield County has been saving for this renovation for fifteen years. This year when the capital savings reached the million dollar mark, the amount was matched by a grant through the WA State Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation. The jail will not move.

Some interesting tidbits about the Garfield County Courthouse:

It was built in 1901 at a cost of \$19,583.

The face brick was supposed to be cherry red and hard but had to be painted three years later.

The courthouse is 11,330 square feet.

It is one of only two historic courthouses that has not been physically impacted by additions or annexes.

Only one governor came to Garfield County so his statue is on the lawn. He is Samuel Cosgrove.

Lady Justice stands on the roof above a clock in a dormer below.

The clock in the auditor's office was installed just 91 years ago.

The courtroom boasts the original oak seats with wire racks under



each seat to hold men's hats.

Garfield County, like some others, had turf battles over the location of the county seat. Although it was the outcome of an election that selected Pomeroy over Pataka City, the U.S. Congress had to settle the controversy for in 1884.

Former WSAC Staff Member Remembered

Barbara Stevens, 81, who retired from WSAC and was married to Thurston County Commissioner Ken Stevens, passed away on April 20. Ms. Stevens is survived by her six children, 12 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. WSAC send condolences to her family.

WACO Remembers Mabel J. Jeter

Mabel J. (Fosse) Jeter passed away on April 28, 2010, in Eugene, Oregon, at the fantastic age of 102. She was born to Johannes M. and Enga N. (Rykken) Fosse on April 7, 1908, in Stevenson, Washington. She has been a resident of Olympia since 1960.

In 1901, her parents homesteaded 80 acres north of Stevenson. In 1907, they moved downtown where her father built a home in which she was born. She attended schools in Stevenson. In fact, she only missed one high school reunion there. She worked in the county Prosecuting Attorney's office during high school.

Politics intrigued Mabel and in 1930 she ran for and was elected Skamania County Clerk-Auditor and held this office two terms. She also served two terms as County Auditor. On June 25, 1943, she married George M. Jeter in Stevenson. George preceded her in death on March 12, 1997.

In her 4th term as County Treasurer, she resigned to accept the position of Executive Treasurer to the Washington Association of County Officials in Olympia. She held this position until her retirement in 1972.

Mabel was a council member of Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church in Stevenson. She was a member of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Olympia and at the time of her death, was a member at St. Mark Lutheran Church in Lacey.

She served as Worthy Matron of the Order of Eastern Star; President of Toastmistress Club; Camp Fire guardian; Mother Advisor Order of Rainbow for Girls. During World War II she was very active in the Red Cross and American Legion Auxiliary. She was President of Stevenson High School Alumni Association and of Sons of Norway in Olympia. She was a member of the Olympia Daughters of Norway. She served as President of the State Association of County Auditors and County Treasurers and was an honorary member of these associations as well as the Washington Association of County Clerks and the Washington Association of County Officials.

Mabel enjoyed being with people but the most important thing in her life (after God) was her family. She will forever be remembered for her kindness, thoughtfulness and wonderful sense of humor. She enjoyed playing pinochle, traveling, doing needlepoint, crocheting, watching over her roses and, in younger years, trout fishing.

Former Thurston County Coroner Wesley W. "Tag" Frazier Remembered for Life of Service

Friends, family members, and former co-workers described former Thurston County Coroner **Wesley W. "Tag" Frazier** as a gregarious, fun-loving man. "He was this big, gruff teddy bear," said Tumwater City Councilman Neil McClanahan. "When he needed to be tough, he was tough, but most of the time he was really sweet."

Frazier died of natural causes at Providence Mother Joseph Care Center in Olympia Saturday. He was 88. Frazier began his career as a law enforcement officer in Thurston County in 1957 as a road sheriff's deputy. He later served as a juvenile

officer and earned the rank of detective. In the mid- 1970s he was appointed chief civil deputy under Sheriff Don Redmond. He also served as undersheriff and chief of detectives.

Coroner Hollis Fultz used Frazier as a deputy coroner in the late 1970s and 1980s, prompting Frazier to run for coroner in 1980 when Fultz retired. Frazier served as Thurston County coroner for two terms before retiring in 1986. "He was very proud of his time as a coroner," said Keith Twibell of Fern Hill Funeral Home. Twibell met Frazier as a young child, when Twibell's father, Doug, ran the funeral home.

Doug Twibell met Frazier when he started working for Fern Hill Funeral Home in 1962. The two were longtime friends and professional acquaintances. Doug Twibell said he remembers Frazier as a gruff, but jovial man, always willing to help a friend in need. "That's just the kind of man he was," Twibell said.

Doug Twibell said Frazier had a lot to do with bringing the Thurston County Coroner's Office into its own in the 1980s. Before Frazier, the office offered mostly "basic information," Doug Twibell said. "I saw the evolution of the office and the need for professionalism under him," McClanahan said. McClanahan served as undersheriff for Thurston County and as deputy coroner for Frazier.

Frazier saw that Thurston County needed a full-time coroner with assistants and made the office a more modern organization, McClanahan said. "He was very much dedicated as a civil servant," McClanahan said.

Under Frazier's tenure as coroner, the office moved to a new office at the Thurston County Courthouse and Frazier and his assistants started attending educational seminars and classes through statewide and international coroner's associations. "They began to put together an office worthy of investigation," Doug Twibell said.

Frazier served on the WACO Board of Trustees as the Coroner's representative for several years.

Department of Ecology to hold three Reclaimed Water Workshops

The Department of Ecology (Ecology) proposes to adopt rules for reclaimed water use by December 2010. The goal is to develop a Reclaimed Water Program encouraging the use of reclaimed water; assure the health and safety of Washington citizens; protect the environment; and allow us to use our precious water resources wisely.

What is included in the draft rule?

- Procedures and responsibilities for regulatory review, permitting and enforcement.
- Technical standards for treatment, storage, distribution, and use of reclaimed water.
